
Your midwife will offer you checks when you tell us you are pregnant.

These are for the health and safety of you and your baby. They include blood tests and scans.



Checks happen at different times during your pregnancy.

Your midwife will tell you when these will happen.



You might have the same test more than once. This is to check everything is okay with you and your baby.


You can say yes or no to having a blood test or scan.



# First tests and scans Blood tests and vaccinations



Tests carried out by your GP practice or midwife are free.




Blood tests will check for:

- Sickle cell disease and thalassaemia
- Blood type
- Rhesus status
- Infections




## First tests and scans Blood tests and vaccinations



Sickle cell disease is when it is hard for the blood to move around the body.

Blood might get stuck which can be dangerous for you and your baby.

You will need extra checks if you have sickle cell disease.



Rhesus status checks to see if you have a protein in your blood.

If you are rhesus negative you will need other checks to keep your baby safe.



## First tests and scans Blood tests and vaccinations



Infections include hepatitis B, syphilis and HIV.

If you have an infection, your care team will offer you treatment. You can ask questions about your treatment choices.




Vaccinations help keep you and your baby safe.

Your care team will check which vaccinations you have had.

They will ask if you want to have vaccinations to protect you and your baby.



# First tests and scans Scans



There are different reasons why you might have a scan. An early pregnancy scan checks:

- The size of your baby
- · The heartbeat
- · Where your baby is
- How many babies you are having
- · If your baby is growing well




A nuchal translucency scan (NT) looks at the space at the back of your baby's neck.

This checks for:

- Down's syndrome
- Edwards' syndrome
- Patau's syndrome



## First tests and scans Scans



Your midwife will tell you if there is anything you need to do before these checks.

You can ask your midwife questions.



All checks are carried out by trained professionals.

They can support you to understand the results and what happens next.


You have a right to make decisions about your care.





Sometimes you might need extra help during your pregnancy. Talk to your care team if there is anything you are worried about.

This will help plan to keep you and your baby healthy.


